Dress Code

As we come toward the end of another school year, I'd like to remind everyone of our Dress Code. Over the last two weeks, as we have experienced different settings for learning at the school, a number of learners have not been sufficiently thoughtful about their dress code and as a result are in danger of sending an incorrect and ill-advised message about themselves to others in our community – this needs to be addressed immediately and sustained for the rest of the term.

In our Dress Code we have been very clear that being smartly dressed is a pre-requisite for engaging in serious and successful learning. We have acknowledged, however, that in our learning model, which is tailored to meet individual need and which is designed to ensure that young people learn to make good choices taking responsibility for their outcomes, uniformity can be seen as incongruous. Thus the ethos our dress code embraces, and which is not negotiable, centres on respect for oneself, other people and the world around you. Making no effort to dress smartly, having your tie unfastened and your shirt un-tucked, shows a lack of respect for the serious learning ethos in which we believe at Honywood and will, therefore be challenged here. Every youngster should think carefully about our Dress Code and ensure that we end the year with everyone matching up to what the code requires. These questions may help learners to do so:

- Am I wearing a skirt which is black and knee length?
- Are my trousers black trousers, or are they black leggings?
- Are my shoes black low-heeled and suitable for school (heels above 5cm are unlikely to be suitable)?
- Am I wearing my tie, shirt (and where I choose to) jumper appropriately?

If you can answer these questions in the affirmative then there is every chance that you are living up to the high standards we set ourselves at Honywood. If not, you need to address this as a matter of urgency. Whilst you may argue that the way you look does not affect how you learn, I would contend that sloppiness, in all areas of our lives, can be invasive. If you can't make the effort to dress smartly, where else will 'good enough' affect your learning?

For those families looking to purchase clothing for next year, below is a summary of the dress code as published on our website. I am aware that there has been some debate (generated by youngsters who, of course, want to be fashionable) as to our definition of the words '*shoes*' and '*trousers*' and that this is causing difficulty for some families.

I trust that the following will provide everyone with clarity. Trousers are not leggings or jeggings. Black trousers that fade and become grey cease to be black trousers! Thus if you choose, as some learners do, to wear black denim trousers you are likely to have to pay out more over time as it is likely that as your trousers fade they will cease to be black.

I understand that some learners are expressing the view that only a particular brand of training shoe is acceptable to wear to school. This is not the case. Any shoe that is black is acceptable to us, so long as the heel height is less than 5cm. Of course, a shoe that is black with a white stripe (even if that happens to be a popular logo) does not meet the expectations in our dress code. Shoes with white lines around the base of the shoe are also not acceptable as they cannot be said to be black. If you have any doubts as to the clothing you intend buying this summer, please get in touch with the school and we will give you our view as to whether what you have been asked by your youngster to purchase is, in fact, in line with our dress code – for those parents experiencing this for the first time (as you are encountering these decisions with

your oldest child) can I encourage you to challenge the use of the word '*everyone*' by your youngster; in my experience this is an overused bargaining position adopted by our youngsters!

Within our framework of respect, our expectations for our dress code are, therefore, as follows:

Dates for both 2017/18 and 2018/19 are broadly in line with those set by Essex County Council. Please do, however, check carefully when booking holidays as our staff training days, which are set by the school and

often affect the beginning and end of terms, can mean that beginnings and ends of terms can vary a little from those set by the County Council.

Finally, families will be aware that in 2013 the Government changed the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations from their original wording as set out in 2006. This meant that the previous situation where Headteachers were allowed to grant leave of absence for the purpose of a family holiday during term time in "special circumstances" of up to ten school days leave per year changed. **All** references to family holidays and extended leave as well as the previous statutory threshold of ten school days were **removed** from the regulations. The amendments made clear that Headteachers **may not grant any leave of absence** during term time unless there are **exceptional** circumstances.

We have worked hard with families over the last couple of years to avoid the situation that has occurred in many Essex schools where families have faced fines for taking their youngsters out of school during term time. For many families this has been especially difficult, with lots of you writing to me pointing out the additional cost of taking holidays during the standard school breaks. Sadly holidays being cheaper outside of the normal school breaks is **not** a reason for considering exceptional circumstances. If you are in the position where you need to consider taking your youngster out of school, please complete the form available on our website and send this in to me as far in advance as you are able, so that we can engage in constructive dialogue as to the exceptional circumstances you face, thus avoiding any family facing a fine over this issue.
